Improving Equality and Livelihoods: Grace's Story

Grace Aciro's family was used to eking out a small living on their subsistence farm in northern Uganda. Grace has seven kids and a husband who believed that a woman's role was limited to the household.

"When we had just started living together he told me that he had

married me to do all the household activities," says Grace. But after training with Oxfam's partner in Uganda, her and her husband's attitudes shifted as they learned about women's rights and the importance of a woman's role in economic empowerment.

Now their days consist of shared household and

farm chores. In doing this, they've increased their farming yield dramatically and are lifting themselves out of poverty.

"Before the training we didn't even know the importance of farming. We practiced it on a small scale level where we would sell just a little bit of our yields to buy things like soap, sugar and salt. This training has turned our farming into a profitable economic venture."

Today the couple are true partners in family life and business, making farming decisions together and budgeting for school fees, food and medical bills. Grace and her husband are happy to share what they've learned with friends and neighbours.

Through your support and Oxfam's new Creating Spaces program, you'll help families in Pakistan, India, Indonesia, Nepal, Bangladesh and the Philippines challenge the social norms that devalue women. Together we can help more families, like Grace's, build better lives.

Quilt Stitched With Hope and Encouragement Arrives in Zimbabwe

Through Oxfam's recent Threads of Change campaign, donors pulled together to raise \$103,000 and created a quilt of inspirational messages that made its way to communities in Zimbabwe.

We brought the quilt to one of the hardest hit drought areas, Umuguza district, where we met with a group for women's economic empowerment. With your help, Oxfam is working with the women of a self-help group addressing issues such as child protection and sexual reproductive health rights. The women are also learning marketing skills, opening their own businesses and creating a pot of money to help each other's business ventures grow.

The program is part of a larger program raising awareness of HIV & AIDS prevention while increasing access to treatment. These women are even creating a health clinic where they can get HIV screening and health checks they currently can't access nearby.

Countless women shared with us their heartwarming stories of the way their lives have changed thanks to donors like you.

Senzeni Ndlovu told us she's now providing for her children and has been in for cervical screening. Her goal now is to, "sell popcorn and airtime and to build a new home and tuck shop within the next year."

Meanwhile, Sithabile Mpofu started a soap-making business to help her sick daughter.

"Through making the soap, we can get the medicine my daughter needs for her blood transfusion."

A BETTER BUCKET

TIGHT LID: -

Keeps water in and debris out.

RUGGED:

Made of durable UV-treated plastic.

CLEAN CURVES: -

Makes it easy to clean.

SPIKE FREE:

Other buckets usually have a sharp plastic spike on the bottom. We removed this so people can carry it on their head.

CAPPED OFF:

Built-in cap so people can pour water in without taking the lid off, helping to prevent contamination

SIZED JUST RIGHT:

At about 3.7 gallons, this bucket is not too heavy.

STACKABLE:

It's easy to stack so it's cheap to send out in bulk.

WATER ON TAP:

The tap means people can get water without dipping dirty cups into it.

We know that clean water saves lives, but in order to access it, people need to be able to safely transport and store it. That's why Oxfam's award-winning bucket makes all the difference.
