

OVERVIEW - THE SCALE OF THE DISASTER



- Over 13 million people in the Philippines are affected.
- Over 4.2 million people have been displaced.
- There are 5,000 confirmed deaths, but this number continues to climb.
- Access to some disaster affected areas has improved as roads, seaports and air strips have opened and some telecommunications have been restored.
- The most immediate needs are food, clean water, shelter and sanitation.

OVERVIEW - THE SCALE OF THE DISASTER



- Many areas remain inaccessible, so clearing roads and functionality of ports and airports is critical.
- The focus is on getting to remote areas those with reduced mobility are most vulnerable.
- The Philippines government has declared a state of emergency and requested international assistance. Oxfam is coordinating with the Philippines government and the United Nations.
- A third of the country's rice growing areas were affected. Missing the next planting season will potentially leave millions of Filipinos without their staple food.



IN THE FIELD

An entire city devastated:

Golda Hilario from Oxfam's rapid assessment team in Tacloban said the entire city had been devastated. Oxfam's team found no running water and no electricity and people taking desperate measures, like puncturing municipal pipes, to get water.

Shortages of food:

A mother with 2 small children, who works selling fish with her husband, told Oxfam, "Many storms have passed here. But we did not expect a storm that brought a 'tsunami' with it." She had received a food pack she expected to use within two days.

Shortages of fresh drinking water:

In northern Cebu, children as young as five are fetching water for their families, carrying one gallon (nearly four litres) at a time.

Oxfam's Tata Abella-Bolo, part of the agency's assessment team in the area said the collected water was mixed with salt water, but people were still drinking it.

OXFAM'S RESPONSE



- Oxfam was one of the first organizations to respond, having been present in the Philippines
 for over 25 years. Oxfam's work there is focussed on support to small farmers, increasing
 opportunities for women, and preparing for and responding to humanitarian emergencies.
- Priorities include reaching the most vulnerable with safe water and sanitation facilities to reduce public health risks, and food security.

OXFAM'S RESPONSE



- Despite logistical challenges, Oxfam has distributed emergency water supplies to thousands in Tacloban
- Oxfam teams in the affected areas (Northern Cebu, Leyte and Samar) are providing household level water purification
- Immediate food needs will be addressed through food distribution or cash transfers depending on the availability of food and accessibility of markets
- Immediate income needs will be met through cash for work (clearing debris, aid access to remote locations, etc.)
- Restoring livelihoods where quickly feasible
 (e.g. Purchase and distribution of fishing nets)
- Oxfam is distributing emergency kits and supplies in the Cebu, Leyte and Eastern Samar regions.
